Come Be a Show Off! By Florene Carney

I have a lead crystal planter with a silver medallion on the front saying "Best of Show" just waiting for a home. It will go home with the winner of the first ever "Official" Plant Show held by the Alaska Rock Garden Society this summer. During the Alaska Botanical Garden Fair on June 28 and 29 there will be a section set up in the style of a true English Plant Show and judged in a similar manner. After consulting with Alan Grainer, who has been the Alpine Garden Society (United Kingdom) Show Secretary for 9 years, we feel we have basic information to move forward.

The most important part of a plant show is the exhibitors. That means YOU! So, as we move into spring, think about potting up your best plants to show at the Plant Show. You can start them from seed, order from one of the Alpine Nurseries, buy locally, or dig plants out of your garden. We hear rumors that in England plants people have been known to dig out some of their best plants and spend a great deal of time making them look like they grew in a pot. I am sure that Sally Arant will have some Primulas and Rhonda, at Recluse Gardens, already has plants threatening to bloom in her Alpine House. Check your favorite local nursery for a hidden treasure that could win a first prize! This is an opportunity for those of you who don't have a rock garden to grow those lovely little plants and have the added benefit of being able to compete with other enthusiasts. For this first show we recommend 6" terracotta pots (or larger if necessary to hold your specimen). Categories will depend on the entries, but we will be pretty liberal at the onset, so don't hold back!

There will also be a need for volunteers to help set up, receive plants, get set up for judging, do the actual judging, assist judges, set up plants for display after judging - for viewing by the general public, and last of all help to clean up. Propagation of Primula By Seed By Sally Arant

Many primula species have very specific requirements for seed germination while others are easy as can be. The key is to use seed that is as fresh as possible. Refrigerate seeds after drying collected seeds or receiving seed by mail. It is also important to simulate as closely as possible the conditions the seed experiences in the wild. This often involves a cold period prior to germination.

Seed may be sown in the garden as soon as the seed matures. This is often the easiest way to keep a good stock of new plants coming along in the garden for personal use. You can also sow seeds in trays and leave them outdoors, where they will germinate the next spring and be ready for planting out in late summer. If you want more control over the process, and want plants that can be planted out in early summer, it is best to start seedlings indoors under lights.

A highly successful and easy method of starting primula from seed is to sow seeds on the surface of very moist seed starting mix in small, sterile seeding trays set in sterile flats. Cover the seed lightly with a dusting of soil. Do not cover seed so small that it looks like powder. This seed will settle into the soil just enough by misting down the surface. A variety of seed mixes is available, but it is preferable that the mix remains porous after wetting it down.

Sow seeds in December or January and give them a cold period, one week to three weeks long, not necessarily below freezing. This can be accomplished quite well by covering seed flats with a protective cover, such as another flat, then wrapping them, top and bottom, in thick layers of old blankets and placing them in a covered outdoor area or unheated garage. The blankets insulate like a layer of snow without the trouble of digging out the trays when you are ready to bring the seeds indoors.

After being brought indoors, the flats of seed trays are then covered with a clear covering and put under shoplights at close range for approximately 12 hours a day. Give them a little bottom heat to simulate early spring. Very low heat for a few hours a day with a heating pad works well. Check the seeds twice a day, lightly misting the soil surface as needed to keep a high level of humidity. Most seem to prefer cool air temperatures, high humidity and bright light best. Don't cook seeds that were meant to germinate happily high in the snowmelt of the Himalayas.

Keeping a seeding journal from year to year helps to remind you how long particular species take to germinate. Some take as little as two days and others may take weeks or longer. Some will even germinate sporadically over a period of years to ensure that a good number will make it at some point or other! If seeds do not germinate within a few weeks, you may want to try another cold period.

After seeds germinate, it is preferable to reduce the bottom heat and continue the lights as usual, cool and bright. Some seedlings may grow faster with continued bottom heat. Do what works for you. As soon as seedlings are sturdy enough to handle, prick them out with a pencil and transplant them into cell packs filled with Pro-mix or similar. Most varieties may be pricked out 2 or 3 in a bunch and grown on as a more robust clump. Begin fertilizing with a dilute water-soluble fertilizer with every watering. Never allow young transplants to dry out. Grow these on for 1-2 months then transplant on up to 4" pots until they can be planted in the garden in spring or grown on further in gallon pots.
