This WWSW will be held on March 13-15, 2009. Because the meeting will be in March, all proposed awards and business reports need to be prepared earlier.

"The Fund is intended to be a resource in support of special, one-time projects that advance the art and science of rock gardening." Many projects have been supported - from publications, rock garden construction and preservation, public education, and seed collection.

Mary Moline has served brilliantly for many years as our Treasurer, and must step down. If you are willing, or know of someone who would be good for the position, please contact Carmel as soon as possible.

Plant Tags that Worked!

This last spring as I helped clean up the Rock Garden at the Alpine Garden Grill (Recluse Gardens) I noted that the tags that Rhonda had used two years ago are still very clear and easy to read. It looked like they were written in heavy pencil on the square metal tags hanging from a single stand stuck in the ground. When I called Rhonda to question her about it she said that she had written those using the softest graphite she could find. I went to Blaine's Art Store in Anchorage, and they helped me find a couple that I am experimenting with in my own rock garden. I am still not sure if the style tags she used, with the single stand, which allows the tag itself to swing in the wind and keep the sign from being blasted head-on by the ice crystals and sand is the biggest factor or if it is just the graphite pencil she used. I have both kinds of tags that I'm trying with the soft graphite pencil and will keep you posted. If you have tried something that really works for marking your plants, please share your information with us.

Slug Control Experiment (or Cheap Slug Control)

Last Spring while browsing through one of the garden magazines I read about a slug control that I really questioned. The writer recommended taking the lint out of your dryer trap and rolling it into ropes and placing it around your most treasured plants to keep the slugs away. "Yeah, right!" was my first reaction. Then after I thought about it for a while I thought, why not give it a try? There is no cost involved. When I dry towels or flannel shirts I have a pile of lint in the screen, so why not?

I started saving the big batches of lint that cover the dryer screen and rolled it into ropes. The slugs love the hostas so I started there. Each hosta got a ring of lint around the base. I patted it against the ground and made sure that it didn't have a break in it. I was nervous that it would look shabby, but when I backed away you could hardly notice it (I didn't use the lint gathered from the red robe my Mom loves – too red!) Surprisingly, most of the lint turned out to be one shade of gray or another. Some more blue, some lighter, but all of it disappeared pretty quickly under foliage or blended in with the soil. I didn't re-apply all summer and by fall I only had one hosta that had any kind of slug hole in it and I think that was because some of the leaves had grown over and rested on a rock and the slugs used that as a bridge. Even that one only had a few spots! I am going to try it on many other plants next year. I hope you will too and report back whether you thought it was a success or failure. It didn't kill the slugs – I still go on the rampage periodically with a spray of clear ammonia and water or a dose of Sluggo, but for plain old protection I'm hoping that I'm really onto something here.


Election of Officers

Seed Exchange


The ARGS Seed Exchange is a wonderful opportunity to get seeds for those special plants you have seen in other gardens, but could never find on the market. Those who send in seeds get first choice and usually some extra seed at the end.

Mark White has once again agreed to be the Intake Manager for the ARGS Seed Exchange. Please put your cleaned seeds in an envelope. In the upper right hand corner of the envelope PRINT your name, the plant name (botanical name is preferable but common if that is all you know) and whether it is wild or garden collected. Put all your seed packets in a padded envelope, so the seeds don't get smashed and send to Mark. He would like to have all the seed by December 1st and the list will go to ARGS members in the January Newsletter. Mark hopes to have all seed distributed by February 1, 2009.


