The Making of My Trough Heaven

Many moons ago, when the Alaska Rock Garden Society got started, I was very excited about those cute little plants shown in the beautiful slide shows. I had gotten some plants from my husband since instead of bringing me tee shirts from his out-of-town work adventures, I asked him to bring me plants. I created a rock garden for them and heard about seed exchanges and the Society's seed gathering expedition to China. How exciting it could be to try and grow some of the beauties from seed! So in between his trips, I asked him to build me a bed that I could fill with dirt and start growing. Since bigger is almost always better, I had him make it 6 feet wide by 10 feet long and use 2-in by 8-in dimensional lumber for the sides.

I wheelbarrowed a lot of gravelly dirt from my truck in the driveway back to my "alpine propagation bed". I bought some seeds from the exchanges and the expedition and planted them. Little white labels went into the dirt next to little areas of seeds. Well, the magpies decided that what came up should be a surprise and pulled all the labels out. My children's activities took up a bunch of my time, and weeds started to grow. The little weeds got bigger and bigger and soon I had a willow and a birch tree growing in between other opportunistic weeds in that nice raised-bed warm soil. I think the only two plants I got from the seeds were some allium and iris, neither of which were very exciting.

Fast forward to kids being out of the house and me looking out my kitchen window at this weed patch with two trees that I absolutely had no interest in. For several years I wanted to do something about it and then last year I decided to begin. I pulled the boards apart and started digging. But the roots I met were just too much for a shovel. Luckily, my oldest had rented a skid steer for a project that he was doing, so when he was done, I asked him to stop by before he returned it and give me a "hand". The strong machine lifted up clumps, roots and all so I had a chance of winning the battle.

Meanwhile I had gotten three metal rings – sold as fire pits – that I had the idea to use for small vegetable gardens. Looking at the piles of dirt and the rings all winter, a new plan started to form. I have these hypertufa troughs that I can't lift myself, and that needed a permanent place. I knew the piles of dirt would not be ideal for vegetables as it was very rocky, so maybe I could find a different use for it. I had a lot of scree material and rocks in different colors that also needed a place. So, I figured that I could move the piles, set the rings down, fill them up with the dirt and then top dress with the smaller rocks and scree material and set my troughs on them. After numerous days of digging and moving the dirt around, I finally have something that looks way better than weeds and trees. I made enough room for a chair and I have already sat out there several quiet evenings after my husband has gone to bed just to enjoy the beauty. I am already looking forward to spring when I will be able to look out my window and see little patches of color – just like the plan was in the beginning.



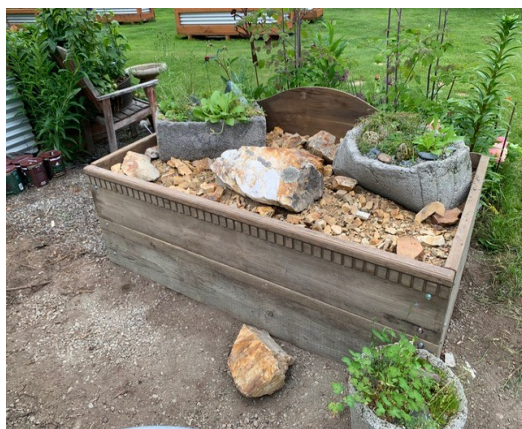

ALASKA NATIVE PLANT PROFILE—CASSIOPE MERTENSIANA

Cassiope mertensiana is native to sub-alpine tundra of western North America, from Alaska to California. It forms a low sub-shrub with dark green, evergreen, scaly leaves. Plants reach 4-8 inches tall but can form mats a foot or more across. Flowers are solitary in the upper leaf axils, usually appearing in the wild from June through July. In Alaska it is usually found on the north side of mountain slopes. It has narrower stems and leaves and smaller flowers than *C. tetragona*. *C. mertensiana* leaves do not have a groove on the back, unlike its kin according to Verna Pratt.



This species requires acidic, organic-rich soil that is freedraining. The growing site should be cool but in full sun if possible. It dislikes hot, humid weather and performs best with even snow-cover throughout the winter.

Propagation is by tip cuttings taken in late summer to early fall, rooted in a shaded area or under mist. Seeds may be directly sown on a peat-sand mix but germination may be prolonged and the growth of seedlings is quite slow.
